
Another tidbit offered by Dr. Kathy Gradel for enhancing pupil literacy skills...

*ShowMe* is an open global online community that catalogues thousands of lessons. The lesson library is organized by contact area. Peruse the lesson library. Videos

provide reviews on valuable concepts/skills, such as introducing attention getting openings - hooks; explaining civil disobedience, or calculating the slope of a line.

Both teachers and students can create video productions using *ShowMe* once the free application has been downloaded. Your productions can be saved to your tablet camera roll on Android devices. They may also be added to the *ShowMe* Community (public access) or shared privately via email, Twitter, or Facebook. Productions can also be shared with groups that you established.

Turn your device into an interactive whiteboard. *ShowMe* 's application can be used to create an interactive whiteboard on your iPad. Although an Android version of *ShowMe* is available, that version does not have full recording as the IOS version does. Check out *ShowMe* at www.showme.com.

#### **Conga Line**

We often experience some grayness in Western New York State in January and February. Teachers and students alike sometimes get a case of the "Ho-Hums," particularly they are in districts with no break until spring. Described here is one way you can beat the "Ho-Hums" in your class and get your students to review critical content.

Try the Conga Line with your students by following these easy steps:

- Make 2 lines of students facing each other;
- Assign something to review/ discuss. For example, "Generate words that can be used in your writing besides say or said;"
- Pairs share until the teacher starts music (conga music can be used as well as any music of interest to the students);
- One line dances in place while the other line moves down a few places. Misplaced people conga (i.e., dance, stroll, hop, etc.) down the line to find new partners.
- Students then share responses with their new partners until the music begins again. And one line


moves while the other remains stationary.

• Students can conga for a predetermined length of time or until responses have been exhausted.

The Conga Line can be employed with any content area and with all ages of pupils. So....dance away the doldrums while reviewing content with Conga Line.

Two exciting non-fiction books have been selected for our March 4th Hot Reads event.



The Reason I Jump (Naoki Higashida; translated by KA Yoshida and David Mitchell) provides readers with insight into the life and mind of a thirteen year old boy with autism in Japan.


In this book, Higashida pre-

sents answers to fifty-eight questions that he believes other people wonder about him. Critics called the text "startling" and "moving." The News York Times dubbed the book the

"Voice of the Voiceless." What is remarkable is that Higashida wrote the book when he was thirteen years old. Because Higashida was nonverbal, the Times reported that "he wrote by spelling out words on a Japanese alphabet letter board" (Tisdale, August 23, 2013).

The second book featured in March's Hot Reads is I Am Malala: The Girl Who Stood Up for Education and Was Shot by the Taliban. The book retells Malala Yousafzai's advocacy for education in Pakistan's Swat Valley and the Taliban's reaction to her outspokenness. Returning home from school when she was fifteen, Malala was shot in the head

by the Taliban. The book recounts Malala miraculous recovery as well as the story of her family's journey from terrorism. The world recognized the valor of this young woman; she is the dp/0316322407)

youngest nominee for the Nobel Peace Prize. Malala's story gives the reader insight into the plight of young woman in some Muslim countries.
